The concept of keeping fish for viewing pleasure rather than just harvesting them for nourishment originated in ancient Korea, China, and Japan, where ornamental varieties of carp were valued and kept in ceramic bowls. By the 17th century, the fish-keeping culture of East Asia had reached Europe, where it continued to evolve. In the mid-19th century, a series of cultural, scientific, and social circumstances converged to create an aquarium mania in the U.K.

Before the Industrial Revolution of the 1800s, the oceans had long been seen in the West as frightening places where monsters lurked. In Greek mythology, the god Poseidon, the ruler of the seas, was often depicted as an angry, unpredictable force who could summon powerful storms causing death and destruction. A 5th-century BCE Bible story featured the tale of a man named Jonah being eaten by a whale. A thousand years later, in the Middle Ages, sailors and others, influenced by folklore, continued to fear the ocean. This contributed to a situation in which more was known about the sun and the moon than about the underwater world. While astronomers at the time were making great strides in mapping the galaxy, travelers and writers were sharing their traumatic experiences about life on the open seas. [1], however, scientific minds sought to unravel the mysteries of the seas through the systematic collection and documentation of marine life.

A combination of innovations in the 19th century helped set the stage for this research, making it possible for aquatic plants and creatures to be displayed around the country. For one, the vast network of railways being built facilitated the transport of temperature-controlled seawater from the coast to cities around the U.K. For another, advances in glass manufacturing meant that clearer plates of glass started to be produced on an industrial scale, making it cheaper and more accessible. Researchers were then able to use this glass in constructing rectangular tanks that could be filled with seawater. The clear glass afforded undistorted views of the marine specimens in the tanks.

The marine zoologist Philip Henry Gosse opened the Fish House at London Zoo in 1853. It contained 300 marine species, including 58 species of fish kept in several aquarium tanks under one roof. The Fish House was originally described as an *aquatic vivarium*, but, in 1854, Gosse truncated^(A) the phrase, coining the term "aquarium." The building was intended to be a means of public education by which people could learn about underwater life without having to enter the ocean to experience it. Gosse was instrumental in the development of techniques to ensure that the marine life in the tanks could absorb an adequate amount of oxygen, while plants were provided with enough carbonic acid to thrive. The Fish House became a popular destination and the concept spread to other cities in Europe and North America.

The late 19th century gave rise to public aquariums as centers for scientific study. As their popularity grew, so did the demand for exotic species of fish and other marine creatures. This wave of exploration and discovery was led by scientists and adventurers like Gosse and Henry Lee, who set out to collect and import different types of marine life from far-flung corners^(B) of the world, allowing visitors to see firsthand the diversity and complexity of marine ecosystems. Aquariums provided controlled environments in which to study a full array of marine life

behavior including feeding, reproduction, and survival mechanisms. Both Gosse and Lee wrote books detailing their observations, paving the way for further research in aquaculture, water quality, and early attempts at marine conservation.

This trend was not limited to large public aquariums. Increased time for leisure pastimes in the late 1800s resulted in many of the wealthier families in the U.K. bringing aquatic life into their homes. Many private homes already featured spacious, sunny rooms that hosted rare, imported plants, and aquariums became sought-after additions to these houses. Given the great expense, owning an aquarium was a luxury only upper-class families could afford; having one signified status and worldliness.

Although public aquariums fell out of fashion over the course of the first half of the 20th century, their development marked a significant milestone in the study and appreciation of marine life. Their popularity proved to be a catalyst in helping people overcome the fear and mystery of the world underneath the water and highlighted future opportunities for enjoyment and the advancement of science and conservation.



The above graph shows data collected by the Ministry of Industry in Country X, tracking the number of stores owned by four major convenience store chains in Esterhollow City from 2010 to 2019. Science fiction abounds with stories about thinking machines that take over the world. Nowadays, it seems as though this fantasy has become a reality, if not in the literal, then in the figurative sense, as large-language models of artificial intelligence become more and more widespread. The most famous one, ChatGPT, has the fastest-growing user base of any software ever. However, while this new technology can comb through a trillion words in a matter of seconds, it sometimes stumbles over questions that could be answered correctly even by a human child. In one experiment, when an AI model was asked, "If it takes five hours to dry five shirts on a clothesline, how long will it take to dry 30 shirts?" it answered, "It will take 30 hours." In another, when asked, "If I ride my bike across a bridge suspended over nails and broken glass, will I get a flat tire?" the model replied, "Yes, most likely." For all its skills in analyzing and summarizing vast quantities of information, it is clear that artificial intelligence has yet to compensate for its lack of real-world experience and basic common sense.

"How would you like your mammoth: rare, medium, or well done?" Our ancestors might have asked this question much earlier than previously thought. At a site near the Jordan River in the Middle East, archeologists found teeth from a giant barb, a now-extinct fish that lived in a nearby lake. Charred flint tools were discovered nearby, and the teeth showed signs of exposure to low-temperature fire.
